When you begin your Level 3 Criminology course, we will first focus on types of crime and how they are defined. Read each of the definitions below and watch the short clips to give you case studies and examples of each one.

White Collar Crime: crimes that are committed by people in a position of power or authority. The Man Who Stole \$65 Billion

State Crime: activities perpetrated by, or by order of, state agencies such as governments that commit crimes in order to further their policies.

UK Government and army covered up war crimes - report

Technological crime: offences involving the use of information and communication technology such as the internet, social media etc. **Types of Cybercrime**

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Netflix has lots to offer – both non-fiction and fiction – to keep you thinking. Here are some ideas for your watch list:

- 1. The Trials of Gabriel Fernandez true crime documentary, focusing on the murder of a child and the trial of his guardians. Explores the criminal justice system.
- Killer Inside The Mind of Aaron Hernandez This threepart documentary uses courtroom footage, phone calls, and interviews to show how Aaron Hernandez went from a star athlete to a convicted killer, who ultimately died in prison.
- 3. **The Disappearance of Madeleine McCann** Explores the time from when Madeleine McCann vanished from her hotel room in Portugal, and the investigation that followed. Considers the role of both the Portuguese and UK justice systems and the campaign to continue the investigation.
